Hope to see everyone at the Packard Center, and good luck in receiving the items of you might be hoping for.



Ed Morrisson's Duck Decoy Carving Workshop

Ed Morrisson held his semi-annual, four-day, duck decoy carving workshop 13-17 March at the Holiday Lake 4-H Center near Appomattox, Virginia. Over the years, many Northern Virginia Carvers have taken the course, but this was my first time. BJ France and I drove down together.

Most attendees were regulars who have taken the workshop many times. For the regulars, each workshop is a reunion. Many are accomplished carvers who attend for the fellowship in addition to the carving. Some bring their own blanks, tools, and paints, and they carve a variety of ducks and shorebirds. The carvings I saw included mallards, buffleheads, golden eyes, cinnamon teals, coots, a laughing gull, a kingfisher, an oystercatcher (with a real oyster), and a snowy egret. If you don't want to carve waterfowl, Ed will cut you out a Santa Claus blank, which is what BJ carved. Ed's wife, Glenda, attends, as do several other spouses.

The Holiday Lake 4-H sponsors other workshops as well as decoy carving. While we were there, another group was assembling colonial-era black power rifles, which involved a lot of fine carving with chisels. Also, BJ is a regular at a weaving course. I heard talk of banjo making.

If you go...

The program is a "workshop" rather than a "class." There is no set schedule: you work at your own pace. Most attendees start carving before breakfast and carve throughout the day and well into the evening. In my case, I carved all day under Ed's supervision and produced both a canvasback drake and hen. The course fee includes one blank, but you can order additional birds and Ed brings a few extras for purchase. All the tools and paints you'll need are available to use. Most first-time attendees carve a canvasback since the drake has attractive plumage that is straightforward to paint. Ed's patience, enthusiasm, and low-key manner of teaching guarantee success.

Accommodations are basic but comfortable. Most regulars stay in two-person pods, each person with their own room. I stayed in an eight-person bunkhouse with one other carver. You bring your own towels and bed linens. Meals are included; the food was good and the portions ample. Some people bring wine to go with dinner, an afternoon happy hour, or a discreet evening drink.

Appomattox is in rural Virginia about three hours south of the beltway. The Civilian Conservation Corps built the 4-H camp in 1937 to house workers building the dam that created the 150-acre lake. The camp is nicely situated overlooking the long axis of the lake and it is a short, pleasant walk to see the stone dam. There are no major towns nearby, so bring what you'll need. The camp's Wi-Fi is slow and only works in the dining room, and the nearest cellular service is a mile and a half up the road. But, you're there to carve not play candy crush.

From Springfield driving East on Old Keene Mill Road to Springfield Blvd. just past Veterans Bridge, turn right and proceed to the Post parking lot on the right. From Springfield driving West on Franconia Road, passing under I-95 to Bland Street just past Shoney's Restaurant, turn right onto Bland Street and proceed to Amherst Avenue. Turn right onto Amherst Avenue and proceed over Veterans bridge. The Post is on the right, before Kay Jennings Toyota at the foot of the bridge.
